Student Satisfaction Survey 2024-25

The Student Satisfaction Survey for the academic year 2024–25 was conducted to evaluate the overall teaching-learning experience in the institution. A total of 868 students from different departments participated in this survey, providing valuable insights into classroom teaching, evaluation practices, use of technology, and institutional support.

Students expressed a high level of satisfaction with the syllabus coverage, with an average score of 4.03 out of 5. Similarly, teachers' preparation for classes was rated positively at 4.01, indicating that faculty members consistently come well-prepared to deliver lectures. This reflects the institution's commitment to systematic lesson planning.

Effective communication is central to teaching, and this parameter received an average score of 3.97, showing room for improvement in clarity and engagement. The overall teaching approach scored 3.96, reflecting a generally positive but slightly varied experience across departments.

The fairness of internal evaluation was rated at 3.95, indicating that students perceive the assessment process to be largely transparent and unbiased. Mentor follow-up and guidance received moderate appreciation, suggesting the need for more structured mentoring sessions.

Students acknowledged the use of student-centric and participative learning methodologies with an average score of 3.87. However, feedback highlighted that while innovative teaching practices are being implemented, there is scope for greater consistency across all courses. The use of ICT tools such as projectors and multimedia presentations was rated 3.91, suggesting steady integration of technology but also a demand for wider application.

The encouragement to participate in extracurricular activities and institutional efforts to inculcate life skills and employability skills received encouraging feedback (around 3.8-3.9). Students value these initiatives but expect more diverse and regular opportunities to enhance soft skills and workplace readiness.


The most crucial indicator, the overall quality of the teaching-learning process, received an average rating of 3.84. This demonstrates that students are generally satisfied with the academic environment, but targeted improvements in communication, mentoring, and technology use could elevate the experience further.

The feedback indicates that the institution maintains a strong foundation of academic delivery, supported by prepared faculty and fair evaluation methods. Moving forward, strengthening communication, mentoring, and ICT-enabled pedagogy will significantly enhance the holistic learning experience for students.


















































Outcomes of Student Satisfaction Survey (2024-25)

- 1. High Syllabus Coverage A majority of students expressed satisfaction with the extent of syllabus coverage, with an average score of 4.03, indicating that the institution ensures timely and effective completion of the curriculum.
- 2. Teachers' Preparation Appreciated Faculty preparation for classes was highly rated (4.01), reflecting the teachers' dedication, subject mastery, and systematic planning before classroom delivery.
- 3. Fair and Transparent Evaluation Students rated the fairness of internal evaluation at 3.95, showing trust in the assessment process and the credibility of the examination system.
- 4. Scope for Improved Communication While overall communication was positively rated (3.97), students highlighted the need for greater clarity, interactive methods, and participative approaches to enhance learning engagement.
- 5. Moderate Use of ICT and Student-Centric Methods The adoption of ICT tools and innovative teaching methodologies scored around 3.9, suggesting steady progress but also indicating a demand for wider and more consistent application across departments.
- 6. Overall Teaching-Learning Quality Rated Good The most significant outcome was the average score of 3.84 for overall teaching-learning quality, confirming that students are generally satisfied, while also pointing towards areas for further improvement such as mentoring, communication, and skill-based training.
